Mammoth Sightings and Depictions Could be More Recent

New evidence puts the extinction of mammoths closer to 5,600 years ago! This means that some of the depictions in Utah could be closer to 6,000 years old verses 10,000 years old. These images could have been recorded by direct observation or passed down by oral tradition and recorded a few to many generations later.

Utah Mammoth Depictions


1) Depictions from Utah which were based on direct observation or only passed down through oral tradition a few generations.



2) Depictions most likely passed down many generations by oral tradition. The following first two images are very similar in that they are not perfect anatomically regarding the tusks. This indicates that they were interpreted by using the direct observation of living animals at the time of depiction. Notable is the tusks which are positioned more like horns, which they

would have been familiar with.

I recently checked another <u>very old</u> mammoth looking image I had photographed many years ago, and found that there was a strong resemblance to my more recently found mammoth hunting scene. The animal also has a large body with smaller animals in close proximity, an extended nose (trunk) and a line under the scene. This reinforces the idea that this was an animal passed down in oral tradition.






3) Other possible depictions

There is even a crude animal depiction, which could be of a mammoth, since it is within $\frac{1}{2}$ mile of the hunting scene depiction.





In addition, there was a glyph, high on a cliff face petroglyph panel, which bothered me for several years until I realized the glyph looked like an elephant trunk.
